

## **F. P. ASSOCIATION NEWS**

Dear Friends,

It was our original intention to update news from the Association to you once per year. However, we feel that it is necessary to do so again, now that we might pay tribute to our late Vice-President, Roger Nicholson.

### **John Roger Nicholson, 1931-2009.**

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of our Association Vice-President, Roger Nicholson, on 3<sup>rd</sup> March, 2009. Roger had faced a stern battle against brain cancer over the past few months. We learned something of Roger's infirmity just before Christmas when he offered his resignation as Vice-President. Typically, of Roger he did not tell us of the seriousness of his illness, but told us of an operation to be faced in the near future. The Council felt that his resignation at this time was unnecessary since we could not elect a new Vice-President until the A.G.M. As time went on news of a far more serious condition than we had first surmised made us realise that Roger was indeed very ill. His death when it came was none the less more shocking.

Roger Nicholson entered the Secondary Department of Harris Academy in 1943 and left in 1949. He then proceeded to the University of St. Andrews where he trained as an economist. After National Service in the R.A.F. including a spell in what was then Southern Rhodesia he returned there to live his life. He became involved in journalism and also in politics opposing the government of Ian Smith in the 1960s. For a time he sat in the Rhodesian Parliament on the opposition benches. After being imprisoned for passing national secrets to a foreign country, he was released quickly when the U.S.A. reportedly threatened the Smith government unless he were freed.

Roger returned to the United Kingdom once more and became involved in journalism once more and eventually became Managing Director of Thomson Regional Newspapers. On his retirement Roger came back to Scotland, to Crieff, for him one of the best places in the world. There he lived still active in his interests which included his old school. He travelled from Crieff for Harris FP occasions, for Council meetings and was a great supporter of the Association. I personally found him a most supportive Vice-President over the last two years.

We regret very much the death of Roger and offer our sincere sympathy to his wife, Maureen, his children, Bruce and Jane, and his grandchildren. Roger's funeral took place in the lovely Church of St. Fillan's in Crieff on a lovely spring day when Crieff and its surroundings looked wonderful. A tribute was paid to Roger by Professor John Small, a former Harris classmate and there were a number of Harris FPs in attendance.

### **Memories of Harris days**

We have received a few of these, but would like far more. Such items as photographs, especially if they can have names attached, accounts of School occasions and so on would be very welcome and can be sent to Isobel at any time.

We also made a plea for mementoes of school life which would also be gratefully received. These, we hope, would add to a picture of different eras in the school's history. For example, there have been three types of House Badges, the first had the initial letter with a 'squiggle' above and below. This was then modified to a simple coloured badge with the initial letter and finally, a coloured unadorned badge. Examples of the first and second designs would be welcomed. In the same line, House Officials' badges would be welcomed as would any other badges issued by the school at any time. If you wish your badge/memento returned, this could be arranged.

To complete the records of the early days of the Houses we would like to find a copy of a House Officials' photograph for session 1956-57. The only pupils we know for certain on that photo are Eveline Reid, School Captain, and Tony Whiteside who was in Fifth Year.
